will soon come to an end over
there, now that you are in the
push. I know there isn't a better
soldier. Say, my good man. I believe
congratulations are due you. We
noticed Pfc. on your return address
on letter of Feb. 21st instead Pvt.
How about a little explanation.
That's really swell and you know I've

always been proud of you.

Do you think it would be a pretty good idea to try to stay there on guard duty after its over ^{there} rather than go on into the Pacific. I kinda hope it will work out that way.

Loon, said he got to the end of his paper before got around to telling you that Arno Kleitcker went to Miami, Oklahoma, to work in a defense plant. He started this week Monday. If he can find a place he will move his family there later. Owen Boucher took over Arno's gas truck - but I don't know who is running the station. I came home from Alvin's last night. I'm really enjoying myself around home if only the weather would get warm again.

I'm awfully glad you had nice weather in France and hope you have more of it.
